

The main idea of Nehemiah 8:13-18

Those who trust God can rejoice because they always have a place with Him.

The following questions can be used during a family worship time. Take time as a family this week to talk about the Story and what you are learning as you read. The hymns on the next pages are from our worship service. Sing them together as a family during your family worship time this week.



Discussion questions:

What do you like to do when you celebrate birthdays or holidays? Are these family traditions or personal likes and ideas?

In what ways do you see God's faithfulness in this chapter?

Why was Nehemiah able to rebuild the city walls amidst such severe opposition?

When the people of God heard the Word of God read and had it explained to them, they moved into action. In this case, they reestablished the feast of tabernacles. Tell about a time you read the Bible and were quickly moved to action because of what God taught you.

As a family:

Plan a meal with some Christian friends for the express purpose of rejoicing in God's goodness. Let the conversation around the dinner table focus on how God has been good and why He is worthy of our worship and praise.
